This on-line course is a general introduction to Shakespeare's work. After a brief overview of Shakespeare's time and Elizabethan theatre, we will look at six representative plays (Richard III, Romeo and Juliet, As You Like IT, Julius Caesar, King Lear, and The Tempest) and a selection of his sonnets. There will be two short papers (not more than 5 pages each) and three exams. ULL's on-line courses primarily use Moodle for quizzes, exams, and delivery of web links and other materials not in your printed text. Film excerpts and YouTube will be utilized to enhance your appreciation of the visual qualities of Shakespeare's stagecraft. There is a special fee for on-line courses and there will also be a fee for any exams you do not take face-to-face on campus.
